

Recipe

2 ½ oz Dark Jamaican Rum (Coruba)

¼ oz Grenadine


½ oz Rich Demerara Syrup

½ oz Lemon Juice

½ oz Lime Juice

¼ oz Herbsaint

Flash blend with ice, then open pour into Collins glass. Garnish with lime shell and mint.

Only tiki drink with actual Polynesian roots

1830: Protestant missionaries (English)


- John Williams, London Missionary Society

- Hamburg-based shipping company
- Coconut oil
- HQ at Apia

1886-1899: Samoan Civil Wars

- Colonial powers: USA, Britain, Germany
- Succession Dispute; RL Stevenson
- Samoan Crisis, 1889
- 1899 Tripartite Convention German & American Samoa





OUR HERO: DOCTOR IN PARADISE



Dr. Bernhard Funk

Born 1844, Neubrandenburg

1878: Medical officer for Hamburg-American Steamship (HAPAG)High unemployment after German unification

1880: Arrives in Apia as medical officer for Godeffroy
First Western medical doctor in South Pacific

- Later for municipality of Apia

Apia: "Nexus that joined Samoa to a foreign world"

- Much introduced disease as a port town
- Typhus, influenza, TB, dysentery, measles, mumps, whooping cough, venereal disease, etc
- Shark attacks, tidal waves
- Plague

Treated both settlers and indigenous

- Tension between Funk's practice and traditional Samoan practice
- Regardless of ability to pay Samoa 'Uma, 1902

Earned reputation throughout South Pacific

OUR HERO: BEYOND PRACTICE



Second marriage to Samoan Chief's Daughter

- Senitima Funk
- Highly regarded by German "high society"

Took an interest in Samoan culture & language

- Learned Samoan & English
- First document on Samoan language and grammar, 1893 Contributed over 250 artifacts to museum in
- Neubrandenburg (still exists)

Major contributions to meteorology

Awarded Red Eagle Medal for Weather Reporting, 1910

Founding of Apia Observatory

New German government, 1900

- Seen as part of the "old guard"
- Demoted in 1904 for "going troppo" [troppenkoller, tropical madness]

Leaves Samoa 1911, dies in Germany

Personal physician to Robert Louis Stevenson (1889)


- Close friend of the family
- Many mentions in RLS letters and Fanny's diary
- Present at Stevenson's Death, 1894
- Attended each others parties & drank together
- "Beerbarrel Funk"
- Infamous for bierabend in huts (fale) at his house
- Malanga: multi-village binge over several days

- Mystic Isle of the South Seas, Frederic O'Brien, 1921
- NYT 1920
- Adrift in the South Seas, Murray MacCallum, 1934

ROUND 2: THE ORIGINAL




Recipe

Original ingredients preferred by the man himself (adapted)

Absinthe ban

- France, 1905 (most of Polynesia)
- Germany, 1923 (Samoa)
- France lifted in colonies, 1925

Ernest Gannt travels to Polynesia, 1929

- Uncle's yacht as representative of the owner
- Lands in Papeete, Tahiti
- "A whole year passed island hopping."

Bum presumes Donn encountered Dr Funk in Tahiti


Return to US, 1931

PROLIFERATION



Very often copied by early tiki bars (as with other DB drinks)

- Trader Vic: Dr Funk of Tahiti (Round 1)
- Tiki Ti

Very often the name was adapted (as with other DB drinks)

- Brought along with OG bartenders
- Absinthe/Herbsaint is signature element
- Mr Funk
- Dr Fong Mai Kai, Bali Hai, Kon Tiki
- Dr Wong
- Dr Sam Tee

Chinese restaurants began serving tiki drinks

- Became popular in the 1950s
- Hired Asian tiki bartenders
- Often served in Fu Manchu Mug
- Dr Funk -> Dr Fu?





ROUND 3: TRAITEUR



Recipe

1½ oz Demerara Rum (ED 5)

½ oz Rhum Agricole Vieux

¾ oz Benedictine

½ oz Sweet Vermouth

¼ oz Grenadine

1 oz Lemon Juice

¼ oz Herbsaint

2 dash Angostura

Shake with ice, open pour into tiki mug or other vessel. Garnish with lemon shell.
